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Did You Know?

On 18 November 1605 Willem Janszoon, Captain of the Duyfken, owned by the Dutch East India Company, sailed from Bantam in the Dutch East Indies (now Indonesia) to the coast of western New Guinea. After that, Janszoon crossed the eastern end of the Arafura Sea, without seeing the Torres Strait, into the Gulf of Carpentaria. On 26 February 1606, he made landfall at the Pennefather River on the western shore of Cape York in Queensland, near the present day town of Weipa. This is the first recorded European landfall on the Australian continent. Janszoon proceeded to chart some 320 km of the coastline, which he thought was a southerly extension of New Guinea.

Finding the land swampy and the people inhospitable (ten of his men were killed on various shore expeditions), at Cape Keerweer ("Turnabout"), south of Albatross Bay, Willem Janszoon decided to return to the Dutch East Indies and arrived at Bantam in June 1606. He called the land he had discovered "Nieu Zeland" after the Dutch province of Zeeland, but the name was not adopted and was later used by Abel Tasman for New Zealand.

Though there have been suggestions that earlier navigators from China, France or Portugal may have discovered parts of Australia, the Duyfken is the first European vessel definitely known to have done so.

Editor's note: The first Europeans known to have landed on the Australian continent preceded Captain James Cook by 164 years. If Janszoon had his way we would all be Dutch speaking New Zealanders!

We Have a Defibrillator in the PAC Clubroom – Would You Know How to Use it in an Emergency?

If you have attended a PAC or any other First Aid training course you won't have a problem. If you haven't, please read on. Standard Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) can be used on people over the age of 8 and are safe even if you're not sure that the person is having a cardiac arrest. Perform CPR until the AED is ready to use.

- ♣ Start the AED by pressing the button or operating the lid as required.
- ♣ The AED will automatically start by giving you a series of audible instructions.
- With the patient lying on their back, clear the chest of clothing.
- ♣ Apply the pads to the chest as per the diagram on the AED.
- ♣ Once the pads are in place, the AED will analyse the heartbeat to determine whether a shock needs to be delivered. If it is it will tell you to move away.
- ♣ The AED will tell you when to resume CPR if the shock was unsuccessful. Many models have an audible beat to press to.
- ♣ Continue CPR until the AED tells you it is ready to deliver the next shock.
- ♣ Continue this cycle until the patient responds or the ambulance has arrived.

An Extract from an Insurance Claim for Personal Accident

In my haste to prepare the boat well in advance of the first race, I allowed the spinnaker halyard to run to the top of the mast. My crew were not due to arrive for another hour and not wishing to be embarrassed by this unfortunate incident, I devised a plan to retrieve the halyard, taking advantage of the fact that my boat was fitted with an external main halyard.

I calculated that a large plastic garbage bin, full of water would be heavier than me, due to my slender build. I quickly gained possession of a bin from behind the club premises and by means of a system of ropes, secured the bin to the main halyard. By lowering the bin over the side of the boat, it filled with water while I set up a system to secure the tail of the halyard to one of the winches. To ensure that the bin would be heavier than me, I also added a house brick.

1 winched the full bin to the masthead and secured a loop for my foot, in the end of the halyard now held by the winch. I was now in a position to be taken to the top of the mast by the weight of the bin, where I could retrieve the spinnaker halyard and slide gently down the mast.

When I released the winch, my ascent to the top of the mast commenced with greater speed than anticipated. (Subsequent enquiries revealed the bin to be oversize). As I rose, I was not successful in avoiding the descending bin, and received a severe blow to my neck, and upper arm. The impact of the descending bin pushed me beneath the mast spreaders, my left shoulder was bruised and the left side of my neck severely stretched.

However, I remained alert and continued to hold tight the halyard with both hands. Unfortunately, my speed to the top was such, that my fingers were drawn into the pulley causing multiple contusions and lacerations. At the same time, the bin hit the deck of the boat with considerable impact, causing the sides of the bin to split. As the water drained out, I became heavier than the bin and slowly began to descend. My speed accelerated and I received a glancing blow to my left buttock from the spreader which also threw me in the path of the ascending bin. The bin caused bruising to my right buttock and removed skin from my right leg. My descent was stopped by the boom, but unfortunately my legs had gone either side. My natural reaction was to crouch forward from the effect of the impact to the sensitive regions of my body. In doing so my forehead hit the mast.

At this stage I must have lost my presence of mind for it appears 1 let go of the halyard. The bin was now free to descend and as it did so, it was turned upside down as it passed the spreaders tipping the remaining water and the brick onto my head.

As I lost consciousness the upturned bin fell over my head and shoulders, and 1 was found by my crew some minutes later. They did not need to use a defibrillator.

I respectfully request payment of the attached, medical bills in due course.

Editor's note: This is a true account. PAC has been reimbursed for the broken garbage bin. Would I lie to you!
